Dear ADAM owner,

I'm a fellow ADAM owner like all of you. I feel I bought the best home computer on the market for the money. Coleco's decision to stop production of the ADAM as of 12/85 does not change that fact. The Wall Street Journal estimated that there were about 250,000 ADAM's sold as of 12/84 with another 150,000 to be sold in 1985. This is no small number (the IBM PCjr did not sell this well), and will continue to draw software and hardware support. In fact there have been more software products released in 1985 then 1984. There are over 15 software vendors actively developing ADAM programs. On the hardware side, we now have interface boards that will connect the ADAM to most other high speed printers, allow the displaying of 80 columns on a video monitor and output a "voice". The release of the CPM 2.2 operating system for the ADAM allows a wealth of CPM compatible software to be run on the ADAM. Our Software Exchange program has over 8 Data packs full of CPM public domain (free) software!! The ADAM is far from dead!!

I've found that I had to spend alot of time researching problems and sources of software to effectively use my ADAM. This time has paid off and I am very happy with my ADAM. I thought it would be a help to my fellow ADAM owners to start a User group to share this information. I've seen that there is a tremendous lack of information available to ADAM owners and hence many of them have given their ADAM's up as lost. The people who have joined NIAD now have this source of information and access to hard to find ADAM products - they are now effectively using their systems.

You may be thinking - why should I join NIAD ? You may belong to 1 or 2 other ADAM users groups and not feel the need to join an additional one !

- 6. NIAD offers a discount buying service to all members for all Coleco products and 3rd party vendor products we feel are of good quality. We aid the ADAM user to obtain the products they need.
